



Existing approaches to the assessment of vulnerability, hazard, risk, etc.

Generic conceptualisation of vulnerability

Development of methods and methodologies

Testing of methods by applying them to practical problems

Methods of assessing vulnerability tested on the basis of a common conceptualisation that can be utilised by:

Vulnerability assessors (the stakeholders)

Development of a common language

Hazard/user scale dependent applications

Methods of vulnerability assessment with user involvement



- Interdisciplinarity is difficult but it works under the paradigm of pragmatism
- The gap between research and application is still large
- Address appropriate stakeholders appropriately (level, language, expectations)
 - Vulnerability assessment is often more about dialogue / communication than about exact measurements
 - Intercultural dialogue helps to exchange experiences for further take-up
 - Awareness building takes time....
